Festival Film Highlights:

- Opening Night film: A Great Divide: Feature Narrative, OR Premiere, by Director Jean Shim. Seen through the eyes of a Korean American family that leaves the Bay Area for small-town Wyoming, A GREAT DIVIDE addresses the emotional and psychological impact of racism and xenophobia on Asian Americans, the loneliness and sacrifice of immigrant sojourners and the generational expectations that weigh on their children. Q&A with Jean Shim, MeeWha Alana Lee, Emerson Min and Jeff Yang to follow screening. Also available in our virtual program. Jeff Yang will be signing copies of The Golden Screen: The Movies That Made Asian America after the screening.
- Centerpiece film: Photographic Justice Feature Documentary. Using his camera as a "weapon against injustice," Chinese-American photographer Corky Lee brought art and politics together through his decades-long documentation of the Asian American experience. Armed with 19 years of footage of Corky in action, director Jennifer Takaki honors this unsung hometown hero in this beautiful tribute. Q&A with Jennifer Takaki, and Producers George Hirose and Linda Woo to follow screening. Screening with short film: A Roll of Film by Akash Achal Dhruva
- Closing Night Film: Unbroken Ties: Feature Narrative directed by Graham Streeter and Grace Swe Zin Htaik. A Burmese orphan's journey to find his place in America unravels a web of secrets, betrayals, and connections that challenge his identity, his friendships, and his sense of belonging. - Ashima, Feature Documentary by Kenji Tsukamoto; PNW Premiere. An intimate portrait
 of elite rock climber Ashima Shiraishi as she travels to South Africa to try to become the
 youngest person in the world to climb a V14 graded boulder problem. Emotional and
 rooted in character, ASHIMA is a love letter not only to climbing, but to immigrant

- Nurse Unseen: Feature Documentary, Filmmaker Michele Josue; PNW Premiere. This film
 explores the little-known history of the unsung Filipino nurses who risked their lives on
 the COVID frontlines while facing a resurgence of anti-Asian hate in the streets. The film
 unearths the colonial ties between the Philippines and the U.S. that has led to Filipino
 nurses becoming the backbone of American and global healthcare systems. Postscreening Q&A with Director Michele Josue
- Starring Jerry As Himself: Feature Documentary, Filmmaker Law Chen. A family documents how their immigrant father Jerry, a recently retired Florida man, was recruited by the Chinese police to be an undercover agent, only to discover a darker truth. - The Gardener: Feature Documentary. Filmmaker Derek Shimoda. A whimsical Japanese immigrant forges a deep-rooted bond with nature when life gives him a bitter one. Post-screening Q&A with Director Derek Shimoda. Screening with short film: Dragonfly by Julia Morizawa
- Hawai'i Strong: Impactful, insightful, beautiful. Stories about Hawai'i, by Hawai'i filmmakers.
