VIRTUAL PROGRAM

Virtual films are viewed online through Eventive. To watch, set up a free Eventive account from our website. You can buy tickets in advance to virtual and live films via Eventive, and your mobile tickets will be conveniently saved in your account and accessible on your mobile device, or you can print them at home. You can also vote for films that you've watched in both the live and virtual film programs. For those buying tickets and passes the door, please see Guest Services in the lobby.

All Eventive films have a 48 hour watch window. Once you click "watch" and start watching a few minutes of the film, you have access to the film for 48 hours to finish or re-watch. You may start and stop as many times as you wish within the 48 hour window.

Geo-Blocking: All film blocks except one in the virtual program are open to audiences in Oregon, Washington, California, and Hawaii. Please refer to the film pages for information.

How to Fest

DisOrient 2026 is a hybrid film festival with in-person screenings February 21 and March 13-15, and online screenings, March 16-22. Tickets are available for both live and virtual films.

USEFUL INFO

- **Mobile Tickets for Live Screenings:** Purchase your tickets in advance and you will receive your mobile ticket via email or in your Eventive account under "My Tickets." Entering your mobile number will enable text message delivery of your tickets.
- You can also print your tickets at home.
- Tickets and Passes purchased at the door can be sent to your mobile device. Printed tickets/passes are available upon request at Guest Services after completing your purchase in the cashier line.
- **Check-in List:** If you bought in advance using your name/email address and forget to bring your mobile/printed ticket, we can still check you in from our door list.
- We will have concurrent film screenings in 2 theaters. Please plan accordingly.
- During March 13-15, the Green Room tent at the Art House is exclusively open for pass holders to mingle and nosh.
- We have one FREE Shorts Program: The Art of Animation. Tickets are required.
- We are offering a pass for virtual films only that is open to audiences in OR, WA, CA, and HI. Some films have additional geoblock restrictions. Please check the film page(s) before completing your purchase.

WATCH ONLINE

- We will be using Eventive Virtual Festival as our online streaming platform again this year. If you watched our virtual programming last year, you should already have an Eventive account.
- If this is your first festival on the Eventive platform, you will need to create a FREE Eventive account to purchase tickets and passes and to watch all our films. Visit disorientfilm.org to learn how.

JSMA Parking: Visitors are encouraged to park in the Lot 16A located at 14th Ave. and Kincaid St., which offers free public parking on the weekends and is conveniently located near the museum.

To access the JSMA Parking Lot, from 18th Avenue, turn North on University St; turn left onto Johnson Lane (at the roundabout outside the Erb Memorial Union); JSMA parking lot is at the end of Johnson Lane on your left. 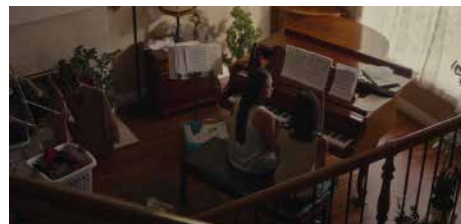
